

Торіс	Designing a Newcomers Program for Families and Students
Definition/Overview	The <u>U.S. Department of Education</u> defines a newcomer as "any foreign-born students and their families who have recently arrived in the United States."
	Newcomers are typically part of one or more subgroups, which will influence their strengths and needs. These subgroups can include: asylees, refugees and unaccompanied youth, among other groups.
	<u>Colorín Colorado</u> states that "newcomer programs offer an opportunity for immigrant students to have their linguistic, social, and cultural needs met since in some cases, traditional English as a second language and bilingual programs are not designed to address those particular needs."
	 Typical features of a newcomer program include: Native language and literacy skill development English language and literacy skill development Culturally-relevant content area instruction Assistance with acclimating to the school culture and schedule Family training on navigating the American education system
Fast Facts	 Research has shown the effective features of newcomer programs to include: Flexible scheduling of courses and students Careful staffing plus targeted professional development Basic literacy development materials for adolescents and reading interventions adapted for English language learners Content area instruction to fill gaps in educational backgrounds Extended time for instruction and support Connections with families and social services Diagnostics and monitoring of student data Transition measures to ease newcomers into the regular school programs or beyond high school (Short, D. J., & Boyson, B. A. (2012))
